



This question always makes an appearance! Despite being fairly simple, children always make silly mistakes and add in the remainder.

There are 14 children. How many full teams of 3 can be made?

Method

To find out how many full teams you can make, divide the number of children by the number needed in each team.

Example:

There are 17 children and you need 4 children in each team.

$$17 \div 4 = 4 \text{ remainder } 1$$

So you can make 4 full teams, with 1 child left over.

Remember: We only count the full teams.



There are 14 children. How many full teams of 3 can be made?

There are 17 children. How many full teams of 5 can be made?

There are 22 children. How many full teams of 4 can be made?

There are 26 children. How many full teams of 6 can be made?



There are 29 children. How many full teams of 5 can be made?

There are 32 children. How many full teams of 6 can be made?

There are 35 children. How many full teams of 4 can be made?

There are 38 children. How many full teams of 5 can be made?



There are 43 children. How many full teams of 6 can be made?

There are 47 children. How many full teams of 5 can be made?

Answers: 4, 3, 5, 4, 5, 5, 8, 7, 7, 9
